LAW

To make supplementary provision out of the public revenue or other funds of Basutoland for certain services for the year ending on the thirty-first day of March, 1962.

(Date of Commencement 2nd February 1962.)

ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF BASUTOLAND.

SHORT TITLE AND COMMENCEMENT.

1. This Law may be cited as the Supplementary Appropriation (1961/62) Law, 1961, and shall be deemed to have come into force on the first day of April, 1961.

PUBLIC REVENUE CHARGED WITH R100,222.

2. The public revenue or other funds of Basutoland are hereby charged with the sum of (R100,222) One hundred thousand, two hundred and twenty two rand for supplementary provision towards certain services for the year ending on the thirty-first day of March, 1962.

PURPOSES FOR WHICH MONEYS TO BE APPLIED.

3. The moneys granted by this Law shall be applied to the purposes and services set forth in the Schedule and more particularly in the Council Parts of the Supplementary Estimates of Expenditure of Basutoland for the year ending on the thirty-first day of March, 1962, as submitted to and approved by the Basutoland National Council.
